Politics


Family

How much do you weigh?

That's a very rude question!

Oh, I'm sorry.



Asking Personal Questions

Remember: some things are just not your business!

Sure, go ahead.

How old are you?

I'd prefer not to answer.

OR
I'm 52 years old. Why do
you ask?

If you need to know something, you can ask politely:

Do you mind if I ask a personal question? You don't have to answer.

If you don't want to answer, you can say:

I'd prefer not to answer.

Emma is at the community centre. She wants to know if the teacher has a girlfriend or a boyfriend.


Emma: Excuse me, do you mind if I ask a personal question? You don't have to answer.

Emma: Excuse me, do you mind if I ask a personal


question? You don't have to answer.

Teacher: Oh, I'd prefer not to answer that question.

Emma: Of course, no problem.



Emma is at a party. She doesn't know if Sam is a man or a woman. She decides to ask about Sam's pronouns, because it is rude to ask if Sam is a man or a woman.


Emma: Excuse me, do you mind if I ask a personal question? You don't have to answer.

Emma: What are your pronouns?

Sam: My pronouns are they/them.

Emma: Thank you!
